WE MEET...Open museum board meetings are held the first Monday of the month, April through October, 10:00 a.m., at Hill's Resort. We encourage you to attend and participate. A final decision pertaining to a boat dock installation will be made in the spring. A reprint of 13,000 museum/visitors center brochures was provided by the Northwest Interpretive Assoc.. through the Priest Lake Ranger Station. Vast quantities of pamphlets, focusing on visitor information and recreational opportunities in the Panhandle National Forest, were dispensed from the Forest Service brochure




MONEY & MEMBERS... Renewable annual memberships are due...\$10.00 for individuals or couples, \$25.00 for business associates. A lifetime membership is \$100.00. Donations are always welcomed. A plaque acknowledging lifetime members will be installed next season. We urge you to remember us via your checkbook. Your support makes it possible to pay the bills, buy supplies, renovate displays and continue to give visitors a glimpse into Priest Lake's past. Hands and heads are needed for committee and special projects...If you can help, let us know. We need you! The Priest Lake Yacht Club honored us with an \$800.00 donation this season. Many thanks! The museum's donation box averaged \$70.00 per week. Interpretive Assoc. book sales amounted to \$839.41, a percent of the profit to be accredited to the museum's account. Current checking account balance, \$1,847.64. Savings account balance, \$7,792.72.

IN PLACE, OR ALMOST ... A finished portion divides the museum's loft. The office area contains additional cupboard, storage shelves and fluorescent light over the work table. The remainder of the loft has been cleared and the floor oiled in preparation for a conference/research room. The balance of the Forest Service/museum joint money was used for this improvement and the Luby Bay Project bank account has been closed. A 24" cast iron bell hangs in silhouette at the south end of the museum porch. It was formerly used as an emergency alarm at the lake and was donated by Gladys Harker. A small black and chrome wood cook stove, a gift from the Tom Low family, gives the kitchen a cozy, authentic finish. Sylvia and Bob Danforth, Spokane miniaturists, have completed 6 authentically detailed figures for a Native American shadow box display and will add their artistic touch to the background to be completed by May 1. The environmental forest display now contains

pecker and mountain bobcat....the cat a gift to the museum from the Priest Lake Ranger Station. Pam Martin and Mary Hovey will assist with displays next season.
