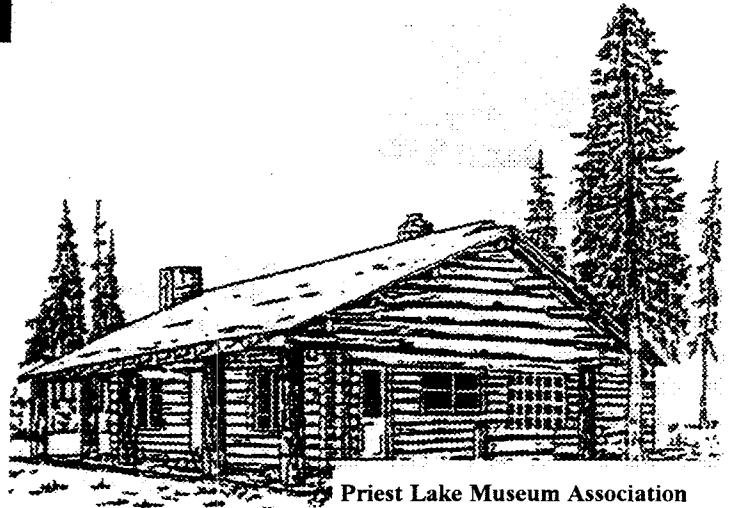

NEW TECHNOLOGY WILL BRING PAST TO LIFE

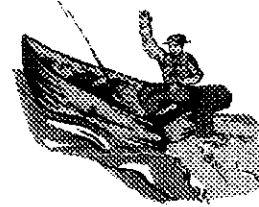
Advances in the world of film and video make it possible to bring images from the past to life for viewing in the present. An industrious project, proposed and inspired by Scott Hill, has been undertaken by the Museum Board of Directors. After previewing a short example of the proposal; the Board unanimously voted financial support of the project. A video will be produced; incorporating old film footage, video and stills; capped with audio gathered through interviews with "old timers" still in the area. Topics of interest will include Early Indian Presence, Naming the Lake, Early Logging Days, Steamboats, Nell Shipman and Fires.

Scott currently works with a film production firm in Colorado. His expertise and the availability of technical equipment will ensure a quality product with lasting value. The video will be created; with authenticity of facts, names and places of utmost importance, yet promises to be appealing to children and adults alike. The Board of Directors believes its participation in this project represents a significant contribution to the community. We hope to present the first of these videos for viewing during the 2002 season.
