

DISPLAY UPDATE . . .

The display team of the Priest Lake Museum has spent the winter months researching the history of Leonard Paul. We all know the store in Coolin is named after him and this year we plan to give you a glimpse of the man behind the name. Born in Neenah, Wisconsin in 1888, his family moved to Priest river when he was 12. His first visit to Priest lake was just 100 years ago – 1904, when Coolin was still known as Williams.

We are most fortunate to have on loan artifacts from Leonard Paul's granddaughters, which will be seen in the Living Room at the Museum, along with historic photographs from his family and a history of his life.
