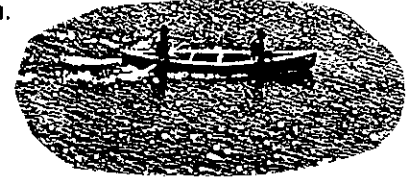
A NEW FUND - - - was created when Lyle Manser, longtime Museum supporter, died last October. Designated "The Mining Exhibit Fund", its intention is to raise funds for a permanent mining exhibit at the Museum, an endeavor Lyle had hoped for. This display will likely be outdoors, centered around the boiler from Woodrat Mine. A form follows if you'd like to donate to this fund. Display team, Marita McDonough and Pam Martin, have begun extensive research. Marita provides the following interesting facts:

"The Continental Mine, whose rich outcroppings of lead and silver had first been used by Indians who melted lead for their Hudson's Bay firearms, was discovered by A.K. Klockmann at the end of the 19th century in the northwest corner of Boundary County. In the early years, it was accessed through Priest Lake. The mine eventually boasted a post office and living quarters for mine employees; in its heyday, the town of Klockmann grew to 350 residents. The discovery and development of this mine has been well documented by A.K. Klockmann in The Klockmann Diaries.

The Museum is working, in cooperation with the USFS, toward a future installation of a permanent mining exhibit. If you have knowledge of any of the old mines around Priest Lake - - and there were many, including Continental, Nickelplate, Milwaukee, Woodrat and ? we would love to hear from you! We are interested in your reminiscences, photos, artifacts, etc. We can arrange for interviews or to pick up items and to copy photographs."

Museum Funding?? Our financial support comes from memberships, donations and memorials. There is no paid staff. The Museum is maintained and operated in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service.

VIDEO UPDATE - - - As a result of the overwhelmingly positive response to the 11-minute video, "The Early Days of Priest Lake", the Board of Directors unanimously approved a fund-raising campaign to underwrite the production of a 25-30 minute version of the video. This longer version will enable Scott Hill, producer, to include a much wider spectrum of the historical events which helped shape and determine this region called Priest Lake. Regina Manser has written several requests to potential funding organizations with some positive responses and the Museum has committed money to this endeavor. However, more funds are still needed to fully fund the project. Perhaps this is of interest to you. If so, please use the enclosed form.
